Pilot Grove C-4 Re-Entry Plan for 2020-2021



The Pilot Grove C-4 School District plan is developed upon the guidance and recommendations of local health officials. It is strongly aligned to the reopening guidelines that have been provided by state and federal leaders and it's designed to prioritize the health and safety of students and staff members as we reopen school buildings and deliver instruction for the 2020-2021 school year. Guidelines and protocols may also be revised as appropriate to reflect the needs of local conditions.

General Information for Students and Faculty/Staff

- Students and faculty are strongly encouraged to wear protective masks, especially in situations when social distancing cannot be achieved, but protective masks are not required. (Could be revisited with level of community spread within Cooper County, Pilot Grove, and the school facility and also based on recommendations by Cooper County Public Health.)
 - o If a student or faculty/staff member is unable to obtain masks, the district will provide masks. Homemade masks are acceptable but must meet school dress code guidelines.
 - Student requests for masks are subject to approval from parents/guardians.
 - Availability of district-provided masks is subject to the district's ability to procure masks (shortages of masks may limit availability).
 - o Masks must be in clean, sanitary condition.
 - Students may not share masks.
- Students will be guided to wash hands multiple times per day.
- Hand sanitizer will be provided at multiple locations throughout the school
- Drinking fountains will not be used, expect for the bottle filling capabilities.
 - o Students should bring personal water bottles from home. They should be labeled with the student name, and in clean, sanitary condition.
- Social distancing will be observed to the greatest extent practicable by all faculty, staff and students.
- Student activities and athletics will be conducted as usual to the extent they are permissible under local, state, and federal guidelines.
- Daily sanitizing and disinfecting will be a priority of the district.
- Attendance incentives for students will cease. Staff and students who are sick need to stay home.

Understanding and Recognizing COVID-19

- The CDC lists the following as possible symptoms of COVID-19:
 - o Fever or chills
 - Cough
 - Shortness of breath or difficulty breathing
 - o Fatigue
 - Muscle or body aches
 - Congestion or runny nose
 - Headache
 - Sore throat
 - Newly emerged loss of taste or smell
 - Nausea or vomiting
 - Diarrhea

General Health Information for Students and Faculty/Staff

- Parents and students, as well as staff members, are encouraged to self-screen for potential COVID-19 symptoms before to coming to school. Anyone with symptoms of illness should stay home.
- Students at school who display health symptoms that could suggest COVID-19 concerns will be checked by the school nurse. If evaluation by the nurse suggests potential for COVID-19 infection, the students will be masked until picked up by parent/guardian. Students who are ill will be walked out of the building by the school nurse or administrator to their parents. Pick up location for sick students will be the front of the building (North side facing 135) and will be identified with a sign as "Nurse Pick up".
- Students with a temperature of 100.4 degrees or higher will be sent home.
- A student excluded from the school environment due to COVID-19 concerns may return to school in accordance with guidelines provided by the health department. Please understand that guidelines may change over time. At the time of this publication, the guidelines are as follows:
 - o <u>Students/staff with symptoms, but not tested for COVID-19</u> may return if the following conditions are met:
 - No fever for 72 hours or more without the use of medicine that reduced fever and showing significant improvement for 7 days after the onset of symptoms.
 - Students/Staff with symptoms, but tested negative for COVID-19 may return if the following conditions are met:
 - 10 days after the symptoms first appeared and
 - No fever for 24 hours without use of medicine that reduces fever and showing significant improvement of symptoms and
 - Symptoms have improved
 - Students/Staff that have tested positive for COVID-19 may return if the following conditions are met:
 - 10 days after the symptoms first appeared and
 - No fever for 24 hours without use of medicine that reduces fever and showing significant improvement of symptoms and
 - Symptoms have improved

Medical Inquiries

Give the nature of the pandemic, the school may make additional medical inquiries of staff and students than they otherwise would have. Please note that federal law typically limits the type of medical inquiries that can be made but given the current state of emergency the State of Missouri is in; as well as the nature of the pandemic more leeway has been given by federal agencies in this circumstance. If a parent tells the school district that a student is ill, the school district may ask the parent whether the students is exhibiting any symptoms of COVID-19. If an employee calls in sick or appears ill, the school district will inquire as to whether the employee is experiencing any COVID-19 symptoms. The school district may take the temperatures of students, employees and visitors to school property on a random basis or in situations where there is a reason to believe the person may be ill. If a person is obviously ill, the school district may make additional inquiries and may exclude the person from school property.

Visitors to School

The Pilot Grove C-4 School District will enforce a closed campus through which all visitors to campus must report to the vestibule by the Superintendent's Office where they will be required to answer a health screening checklist and necessity of entrance is determined by Administration. Parents will be required to utilize the curb side drop off and pick up procedures and will not be permitted in the school building to wait to pick up students. Please contact the office to set up an appointment.

Arrival to School

All students riding the bus will remain dropped off at the North doors. Students being dropped off or driving will enter through the Commons doors. Preschool students will be dropped off at the classroom door and eat breakfast in their classroom as they have in years past. K-6th grade students who wish to eat breakfast will remain in the commons sitting at grade level designated tables. Students K-6th who choose not to eat breakfast will go directly to their classroom upon arrival. 7-12 students eating breakfast will do so at designated tables in the commons. 7-12 students who do not plan to eat breakfast will go to the High School gym and social distance until time to report to 1st hour.

Minimal/Moderate Spread

- Teach and reinforce good hygiene measures such as handwashing and covering coughs.
- Provide hand soap and hand sanitizer with at least 60% alcohol, paper towels, and trash cans in all bathrooms, classrooms, and frequently trafficked areas
- Post signage in classrooms, hallways, and entrances to communicate how to stop the spread. COVID-19 symptoms, preventative measures (including staying home when sick), good hygiene, and school/district specific protocols
- Clean/disinfect frequently touched surfaces and shared objects at least daily.
- Provide masks and other appropriate PPE to staff
- Encourage students and staff to bring hand sanitizer and face masks/ coverings to use from home.
- Take steps to ensure all water systems and features are safe.
- Turn off water fountains and allow students and staff to bring water bottles from home or provide bottled water.
- Ensure ventilation systems operate properly and increase circulation of outdoor air as much as possible, as long as this does not pose a safety or health risk to students or staff.
- Conduct deep cleaning of schools prior to students/staff returning; schedule additional cleanings during weekends or school holidays/breaks.

Low/No Spread

- Provide parents and staff with COVID-19 symptom checklist to use daily before students leave for school.
- Teach and reinforce good hygiene measures such as handwashing and covering coughs.
- Provide hand soap and hand sanitizer, paper towels, in all bathrooms, classrooms, and frequently trafficked areas
- Post signage in classrooms, hallways, and entrances to communicate how to stop the spread, COVID-19 symptoms, preventative measures (including staying home when sick), good hygiene, and school/district specific protocol.
- Clean/disinfect frequently touched surfaces and shared objects at least daily.
- Allow students and staff to bring hand sanitizer and face masks/ coverings to use from home.
- Strongly encourage staff and students to wear face covering.
- Require use of water bottles & filling stations.
- Ensure ventilation systems operate properly and increase circulation of outdoor air as much as possible, as long as this does not pose a safety or health risk to students or staff.
- Conduct deep cleaning of schools prior to students/staff returning; schedule periodic cleanings during weekends or school holidays/breaks (to the extent practicable)



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When a Child, Staff Member, or Visitor Becomes Sick at School

- Provide an isolation room to separate anyone who exhibits COVID-like symptoms.
- Provide low traffic location for parent pick up of student who exhibits COVID-like symptoms.
- Communicate closely with local health officials regarding any potential COVID-19 cases.
- Advise sick staff members and children not to return until they are no longer symptomatic according to CDC requirements.
- Those individuals who have had close contact to a person diagnosed with COVID-19 should stay home and follow CDC & state health department guidance if symptoms develop. If a person does not have symptoms, follow appropriate CDC & state health department guidance for home quarantine.
